# How to contact your instructors

Contact all your instructors via D2L. Use the email function within D2L. We will NOT answer emails that are sent directly to our email addresses. This is important because when you send an email through D2L it adds the name of the course to the subject line. This allows us to identify your emails easily in the flood of other emails we receive every day. Your professors will be instructing ~ 500 students this term so please appreciate that you may not receive a response immediately; furthermore, emails will be responded to during **weekday** hours (9:00am – 5:00pm). If possible we will respond to your question in class so that all participants can benefit from the discussion.

#### Recommendations regarding the formality of your emails

We require that all emails sent to us be written formally. Consider these to be formal letters NOT TWEETS.

#### **Exams**

There are three exams in this course:

- 1. Midterm exams (x2) (30% each)
  - a. They will each be a 50 minute exam conducted in class (see schedule)
  - b. The material examined will be explained in the lecture
  - c. The format will be exclusively multiple choice expect 50 questions
- 2. Final exam (40%)
  - a. It will be a 2 hour exam scheduled by the registrar on the entire course
  - b. It will have two components:
  - c. 70% of the questions will cover material from Part IV (ie. Topics 9-12) (see schedule)
  - d. 30% of the guestions will be from Parts I, II, and III
  - e. **Hint**: for this exam you should <u>focus</u> on those topics that have recurred in different parts of the course.
  - f. The format will be exclusively multiple choice

#### Hints (how to excel in Geog 205):

- 1. Attend all lectures. Attendance is closely linked to success in any course.
- 2. Be ready to engage in the course material and ask questions. Consider forming a study group to make learning easier and more effective.
- 3. Textbook readings are intended to supplement and reinforce the concepts presented in the lecture, but <u>ARE NOT</u> substitutes for attending the lecture. Do not make the mistake of thinking that you can "just read the textbook" or "just attend the lectures and not read" and do well in the course.
- 4. D2L will be used extensively to communicate outside of lecture periods. All lectures, grades, and updates/corrections to the course materials will be provided on D2L. We suggest that you consult D2L every morning in the event of changes, cancellations etc.
- 5. Ask questions of your professors. That is why we are here. Your professors welcome discussion in class and will have office hours alongside their lectures and exams. We urge you to take advantage of these opportunities.
