Official Course Description:

Environmental and resource issues, with emphasis on topics such as sustainability; ethics; planning; policy and decision making; and management strategies. Case examples highlight issues in resource sectors such as freshwater, oceans, parks and wildlife, tourism and recreation, forests and energy.

Course Content:

This is a survey course that emphasizes environmental problems and resource management at various scales (e.g., local, regional, national, international) with a focus on Canadian issues. Environmental problems and resource management considerations involve several interacting systems including the physical environment, economy, politics, and culture. The course will focus on the scope of various environmental issues and touch on the implications of various management options.

Topics: a readings list will be distributed in the first week of classes.

Objectives:

To develop knowledge of concepts for understanding environmental issues and resource management.

To appreciate the variety of approaches for understanding environmental problems.

To understand the socio-political complexity of environmental issues/resource management.

To develop critical appraisal skills.

Text(s)/Readings:

Required: Draper, D. and M.G. Reed (2005). Our Environment: A Canadian Perspective. Third Edition. Scarborough: Nelson Thomson Learning.

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

This course will have **three assignments**, each worth 5%, **two midterms**, each worth 20%, and a two (2) hour Registrar scheduled **final examination** worth 45% that will be held in a gymnasium during the final examination period.

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis. The course grade is calculated by using the weights indicated above and then converted into a letter grade. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

A+ 95 – 100, **A** 90 –94, **A-**85 – 89, **B+** 80 – 84, **B** 75 – 79, **B-**70 – 74, **C+** 65 – 69, **C** 60 – 64, **C-**55 – 59, **D+** 50 – 54, **D** 45 – 49, **F** 0 – 44

If, for some reason, the distribution of grades determined using the aforementioned conversion chart appears to be abnormal the instructor reserves the right to change the grade conversion chart if the instructor, **at the instructor's discretion**, feels it is necessary to more fairly represent student achievement.

Tests and exams may involve multiple-choice questions.

Dates for the midterms and assignments will be announced during the first week of classes.

The midterm examinations will be held in class on dates to be announced. **THERE WILL BE NO MAKEUP OR DEFERRED EXAMINATIONS** under any circumstances, nor may the examinations be written early. Should the writing of a midterm examination for an entire lecture section become impossible due to events beyond the control of the instructor (such as, and not exclusively consisting of; inclement weather, instructor's illness, unavailable facilities, or other "acts of fate") the midterm examination will be written one week later.
