Course Content

This is a survey course that emphasizes environmental problems and resource management at various scales (e.g., local, regional, national, international) with a focus on Canadian issues. Environmental problems and resource management considerations involve several interacting systems including the physical environment, economy, politics, and culture. The course will focus on the scope of various environmental issues and touch on the implications of various management options.

Topics: a readings list will be distributed in the first week of classes.

Objectives:

To develop knowledge of concepts for understanding environmental issues and resource management.

To appreciate the variety of approaches for understanding environmental problems.

To understand the socio-political complexity of environmental issues/resource management.

To develop critical appraisal skills.

Grade Determination and Final Examination Details:

This course will have **three assignments**, each worth 5%, **two midterms**, each worth 17.5%, and a two (2) hour Registrar scheduled **final examination** worth 50% that will be held in a gymnasium during the final examination period. Students are strenuously advised not to make travel plans for the Christmas period until they know their examination schedule.

Tests and final exams are marked on a numerical (percentage) basis. The course grade is calculated by using the weights indicated above and then converted into a letter grade. As a guide to determining standing, these letter grade equivalences will generally apply:

A+ 95 to 100, **A** 90 to 94, **A-** 85 to 89, **B+** 80 to 84, **B** 75 to 79, **B-** 70 to 74, **C+** 65 to 69, **C** 60 to 64, **C-** 55 to 59, **D+** 50 to 54, **D** 45 to 49, **F** 0 to 44

If, for some reason, the distribution of grades determined using the aforementioned conversion chart appears to be abnormal the instructor reserves the right to change the grade conversion chart if the instructor, **at the instructor's discretion**, feels it is necessary to more fairly represent student achievement.

Dates for the midterms and assignments will be announced during the first week of classes.

The midterm examinations will involve multiple-choice questions. The final examination will involve written and/or multiple-choice questions.

The assignments will be in downloadable form on blackboard. Please note, assignments cannot be submitted by email.

The midterm examinations will be held in class on dates to be announced. **THERE WILL BE NO MAKEUP OR DEFERRED EXAMINATIONS** under any circumstances, nor may the examinations be written early.
