**Official Course Description:**

This course is an introduction to the study of Urban Geography with an emphasis on intra-urban community processes and patterns in western cities, rather than urban systems development which is the subject of GEOG 451. It is expected that students will attend all classes. In most weeks the whole class time will be used for lectures; later in the term there will be seminars.

**Pre-requisite:**

Geography 200 level or an equivalent urban course (by consent of the department). It is not necessary to pass all parts of the course to obtain a passing final grade.

Interactions and Communities (Chapter 4)

Behavioural/ Cognitive and Affective Dimensions of Variation in cities (Chapter 5)

Alternative Community Delivery Types and Problems (Chapter 6)

Service Provision in Cities (Chapter 7)

Commercial Structure of Cities: a) Principles of Variation; b) Area Types c) Changes.

If time permits: Governance of Cities; City Roles in History

**Text: Required Reading**

W.K.D. Davies and D.T. Herbert, 1994. Communities within Cities. Belhaven (UK) or Halstead-Wiley (USA). Updates and additional reading from various journals/books will be provided, especially for the first three weeks.

**Grades:**

Midterm Exam: 30% (Tuesday before Reading Week). Second mid term: 30%. (Last Tuesday of term)

Final: 40% (Not scheduled by the Registrar's office). This will consist of 3 essays (max. of 5-6 typed sides at 30 lines p. page for each essay) with a week to complete. Given out 2 weeks before term end and to be completed in 2 weeks.
