Official Course Description:

The physical basis of water resource management. Elements of the hydrologic cycle: precipitation, ground water and stream flow. Introduction to the physical hydrology of different landscapes (e.g., permafrost and mountain terrain) and to methods in catchment hydrology.

Course Goals:

Students in this course will learn to:

- 1. Understand the hydrologic cycle and the water balance equation as a unifying framework for studying and managing freshwater.
- 2. Use various techniques to measure, model, or calculate flows and reservoirs within the hydrological cycle.
- 3. Connect concepts of hydrology to physical geography (meteorology, geomorphology, soils & vegetation, ecology) and human geography (land use, energy & economy, urban planning, sustainability).
- 4. See themselves as part of the hydrological cycle, and understand the needs and demands that others place on the hydrological cycle.
- 5. Be excited about hydrology, and understand it as a broad field of study with many practical applications.

Required Texts:

None. Readings will be provided.

Prerequisites:

Geography 305 or 307 and 339, or a course in statistics, by consent of the Department.

Grading (Weighting):

There is a final examination, to be scheduled by the Registrar's Office. It is not essential to pass all elements/components to pass the course as a whole.

Lab Assignments: 36% (6 assignments @ 5% each)
Quizzes: 14% (4 quizzes @ 3.5% each)

Midterm Exams: 40% (2 @ 20% each)
Final Review test: 10% (Last day of class)
