How to contact your instructors

Exams

There are three exams in this course:

1. Midterm exams (X2) **(26.5% each)**
 - a. They will each be a 50 minute exam conducted in class (see schedule)
 - b. The material examined will be explained in the lecture
 - c. The format will be exclusively multiple choice – expect 50 questions
2. Final exam **(27%)**
 - a. It will be a 2 hour exam scheduled by the registrar on the entire course however there will be an emphasis on part III.
 - b. The format will be exclusively multiple choice

Hints (how to excel in Geog 205):

1. Attend all lectures. Attendance is closely linked to success in any course.

2. Be ready to engage in the course material and ask questions.
3. Textbook readings are intended to supplement and reinforce the concepts presented in the lecture, but ARE NOT substitutes for attending the lecture. Do not make the mistake of thinking that you can "just read the textbook" and do well in the course.
4. D2L will be used extensively to communicate outside of lecture periods. All lectures, grades, and updates/corrections to the course materials will be provided on D2L. We suggest that you consult D2L every morning in the event of changes, cancellations etc.
5. Ask questions of your professors. That is why we are here. Your professors will have office hours throughout the term. I urge you to take advantage of these opportunities.
