Synopsis:

This course covers basic principles of meteorology and atmospheric science with a focus on physical understanding of weather and climate phenomena. Lectures and labs will introduce the atmospheric and physical processes that underlie local, regional, and global weather patterns. We will introduce the concept of climate change and variability and the different natural and anthropogenic influences on Earth's climate.
