### **Course Description**

This course provides an introduction to qualitative research methods and research design in human geography. Topics covered include: basic principles of qualitative methods, theoretical frameworks, methodological design, forms of data collection, ethical considerations, fieldwork issues, data analysis, interpretation and structured writing. Drawing on theoretical and applied examples, the course offers basic skills for the analysis of human-environment relationships through multiple-source qualitative information that can encompass, for example, first-person accounts, life histories, visual records, semi-structured and open-ended interviews.
