### **Course Objectives:**

- 1. To develop greater understanding of the regional approach to geographical analysis.
- 2. To gain a greater understanding of the physical environment of Canada and how that has influenced current and historical development and culture.
- 3. To gain an understanding of Canada's regions from a cultural, historical, political, and physical perspective.
- 4. To evaluate the processes of continentalism and globalization with application of the core/periphery model.
- 5. To gain understanding of society-environment relationships in Canada through integration and application of examples and case studies.
