Official Course Description:

An introduction to conducting international reconnaissance research in geography. Provides a background in various aspects of ethical research practices, qualitative and quantitative data collection, analysis, and dissemination.

Course Objectives

International fieldwork is a required preparation course for students going on field study programs in Geography and Urban Studies. It is designed to provide students with approaches to doing field work/assignments in an overseas setting and to introduce students to a very different form of learning outside the classroom. Lectures use examples of field notes, pictures of locations, video, virtual field trip assignments, and photo essays to help students to develop observational and critical thinking skills focused on subject matter to be investigated in the field. Considerations such as culture shock, positionality, and cultural awareness are also covered in the course material. Technical preparation will include creating databases for data collection and using field apps for data collection (ArcGIS Online and Esri's Field Maps), field communication (Microsoft Teams) and assignment completion and submission (Esri's Story Maps). Students will become proficient with the software by completing assignments like those which they will do in the field. Field assignments will focus on different strategies for collecting data in international settings.
