Official Course Description:

Dimensions of, approaches to, and issues in recreation and environmental management; planning for sustainable tourism; cultural and heritage tourism; adventure and eco-tourism; and other representative tourism and recreational activities and environments. Case studies emphasize assessment and monitoring, policy initiatives and decision-making, and other practical orientations. Further, there will be a focus on regional problems relating to tourism in select world regions. Issues such as solid waste and water management issues, water use, availability, and contamination due to tourism are emphasized. Local and national government's policies relating to tourism operations, economic policy, natural hazards and development will also be a focus.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The general objectives of this course are:

1. To develop greater understanding of issues relating to tourism and environment.
2. To gain an understanding of the importance of tourism within regional economies and the world.
3. To study and understand the concepts of maintaining and sustaining the environment as a resource for tourism.
4. To gain an understanding of tourism within select world regions through case study examples.
