Spatial study of political systems, structures, and processes, and their relationship to geographic factors.

Course Objectives

The objective of this course is to provide the student with a solid grasp of the underlying principles, and concepts, of political geography.

Assessment Methods

There are several different assessments in including two in class written, closed book examinations held on February 16 and March 20. Each exam represents 25% of your total grade. An applied research project on an area of contested spaces/resources will be conducted with a written report due April 14 (20% of course grade) and presented in class during the last two weeks (10%). The remaining 20% of your grade consists of attendance in active participation in ten scheduled activities (10 x 2%) to be held during the tutorial breakout sessions.

There is NO scheduled final exam in this class.
