Official Course Description:

Introduction to Canadian urban planning theory and practice. The course begins with a brief history of planning in Canada and moves on to cover aspects of modern planning practice such as planning tools and processes, public engagement and growth management. Guest speakers provide expert views on contemporary urban issues such as heritage preservation, land development and planning with indigenous groups. Student knowledge of the course materials will be graded through written midterms and a two part project that includes the production of a short video.

Prerequisites: Urban Studies 253 or Geography 253
